ENVIRONMENTAL AND HEALTH AND SAFETY REGULATORY ISSUES IN ARBITRATION

Purpose:

This webinar is designed for both regulatory and arbitration practitioners who may not be familiar with each other's fields. The talks will identify practical situations where issues of regulatory compliance in the environmental and health and safety fields may arise in the context of disputes which are referrable to arbitration. The aim is to enable practitioners experienced in one field to establish what issues may arise in cases which cross into the other.

It will consider the approach to identifying when regulatory issues may be subject to arbitration. Specifically, it will consider how such issues can give rise to arbitration and touch on features of arbitration such as confidentiality and lack of precedent. The aim is to discuss which regulatory standards apply in cross border contexts, what issues may be raised by regulatory intervention by the state as between parties, to what extent the state's enforcement approach may be affected if the state itself is a party to an arbitration agreement and, finally, issues raised by changing regulatory standards during the currency of an agreement.

Topics:

- How to deal with issues that may arise in arbitration that are associated with health and safety.
- Identification of the common arbitration references in UK regulatory legislation, with a particular focus on environmental legislation relating to the water industry.
- Environmental issues in international arbitration, including counterclaims.
